### **Both mother and child are in limbo...**

Nabeela was sent to Nauru in 2013, after she arrived by boat in July 2013. She did not know where Nauru was or why she was being sent there.

Recently she shared her experience living in the unbearable heat and fighting malaria-carrying mosquitoes; the security guards standing just beyond the curtains, policing two-minute showers to the second; the handful of filthy toilets for hundreds of people. She spoke of friends retreating into the stuffy, suffocating, darkness of their tents; of children cutting themselves; and of the fictitious panacea of painkillers.

Despite being found to be a refugee by Australian and Nauruan authorities, she felt utterly hopeless. She was a skilled professional who could not find work on the island.

Last year she was finally evacuated from the island after Noor, her 2-year old daughter's health deteriorated to the point of partial paralysis, due to the inability of local health providers to treat a routine infection. Today Noor is being nursed back to health. But Nabeela continues to live in limbo. Both mother and child are in community detention; Nabeela without the right to work nor to study. Without clarity over their future. And with very little money to survive.

Nabeela's story is one of many refugees and people seeking asylum forced to make brave decisions as they flee violence, war, persecution and abuse whilst seeking a safe home. Soon after, they face a hostile environment in our country, isolation and lack of support.

## What we do with your generous support.

As a result of the cuts to basic support services for people seeking asylum, our team of front-line workers are seeing far more women, men and children coming through our doors, who are isolated, hungry and need life-saving support. In the last few months, demand for our foodbank has increased by 60%. JRS is committed to continue serving those most in need.

We invite you to make this Lent a time to support people like Nabeela and her daughter Noor, a time of giving to others. With your gift we will ensure that people like Nabeela and Noor – and others facing similar circumstances – have adequate support, casework, basic food and recreational activities along with the psycho-social support they need to heal and live a life with dignity.

## The difference your generosity can make

**\$70** for 2 hours of essential casework and advocacy support

**\$150** is the fortnightly allowance for the food, travel, and medical needs of asylum seekers living in the JRS Blaiket Shelter, which offers emergency accommodation.

**\$280** fortnightly allowance for food, travel, and medical needs of asylum seekers.

**\$600** to help a family seeking asylum meet their basic living expenses including rent, food, travel and medical needs.

**\$4,200** to fund the hire of a caseworker for one month to offer professional support to vulnerable women, men and children, helping them build resilience.
